The discourse did not touch on any particular phase of local history but jumped from the earliest times up to the present day....in dealing with it in this manner Mr Stewart showed his general knowledge about all the details of the founding and development of this community.

One of the many treats of Mr. Stewart was the showing of then ORIGINAL DEED signed by JOHN M MCKEE and his wife for the transfer of a town lot to one of Stewarts Ancestors.

The deed has been in the Stewart family ever since JOHN MCKEE affixed his signature back in 1796

It is supposed to be one of the few deeds..if not the only deed for a McKeesport lot at the founding of the city.

The deed is a real indenture being indented at the top in a wavy fashion. Mr Stewart has it preserved in a frame and it is legible in its entirety.

*THE SIGNATURE OF JOHN MCKEE STANDS OUT IN A BOLD FASHION SO AS TO REMIND ONE OF THE FAMOUS JOHN HANCOCK WHO affixed his signature to an important piece of paper.

OTHER interesting notes that Mr. Stewart fascinatingly brought out were.....

the BRADDOCK SPRING on Robinson street, s.e. of Fawcett street school house...it is so named because BRADDOCK and his army camped there the night before the BATTLE of BRADDOCK FIELD..... WHICH TOOK PLACE July...3...1755. The army water supply was also taken from this spring.

TIN PLATE HILL was the home of ...QUEEN AULI UIPPA....
WHEN GEORGE WASHINGTON visited her.

Mr. Stewart related that the body of JOHN MCKEE was buried in OLD NINTH AVENUE CEMETERY at Ninth & Walnut sts... Mr. Stewart said his remains were later RE-INTERRED in McKeesport and Versailles Cemetery at Fifth & Riverton.

This pageant has been written with a view to portraying some of the outstanding features, epoch and events in this church history. most of the characters taking part are descendants or surviving relatives of some of the above CHARTER MEMBERS...or of trustees or ruling elders of the early church.

Most of the costumes on display are heirlooms, having intrinsic value and hallowed memories have been associated with them.

As we present the following panorama we would ask you to say with us as William Cullen Bryant(in his poem of "THE AGES ") has said,

"Peace to the just man's memory---let it grow
 Greener with years, and blossom through the flight
 Of Ages; let the mimic canvas show
 His calm, benevolent features : let the light
 Stream on his deeds of love, that shunned the sight
 Of all but heaven , and , in the book of fame ,
 The glorious record of his virtues write,
 And hold it up to men , and bid them claim
 A palm like his, and catch from him the HALLOWED FLAME.

SCENE.Ippppppppppp-----Early Presbyterian home showing old fashioned fireplace brass fender, and-irons, wood basket, spinning wheel, flax, table with lighted tapers, large family bible, old Virginian settee, clock, two large print pictures (Currier & Ives) One of these pictures "JANE" be being an heirloom and highly prized by Miss Titzell..the other picture "LITTLE BROTHER" and SISTER" loaned by a relative of Miss Martha Fiddler....The old fashioned clock having belonged to relatives of Miss Kitty Duffy. The white glass fruit dish filled with delicious red apples is an heirloom in the family of Mrs. Jas. Kilgore Old Virginian settee and marble top table were original pulpit furniture The MITE SOCIETY under the supervision of Mrs. J.P.Learn had it re-upholstered and at the present time occupies a prominent place in the Ladies parlour.

The old MELODEON is the property of Mrs. Minnie Hoey Holmes a former

member of this school and church. this brings to mind the wonderful progress we have made in today possessing one of the finest and most up-to-date PIPE-ORGANS in the State of Pennsylvania. Frank McCarrel son of our former pastor Reverend J.J. McCarrel and his wife was organist for several years. Some of the early organists were Belle Mouch ...Mrs. Anna E. Wood... and Miss Mary Tassey. Mrs. wood is still with us and is a daughter of James H. Berry who was a trustee in 1854. Mrs. Berry, mother of Mrs. wood was organizer and first president of the FOREIGN Missionary Society. She was also president of the Home Missionary Society until her death. Later these societies became only "THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY "

(On the death of Mrs. Minnie Mose Jones who was president for many years..Mrs. Sara Lynch Douglas(R.C.) was elected president. writer of this pageant.)

Another daughter of Mrs Jas, h. berry was MRS.Jennie M. Smith(Johnson C) was also president of the Foreign missionary society and treasurer for a number of years. Mrs. Smith was also president of the Home Missionary society until her death. Mrs. Jennie M. Smith left a legacy of Ten thousand dollars to these societies. Mrs. Anna Woods was secretary to the Foreign Missionary society for 32 years. The present ANNA E. WOMAN'S ASSILLIARY being named in her honor and is still active.

The SPINNING WHEEL be the fireside is an heirloom in the family of Mrs. J.OMAR PENNY AND IRON AND BRASS FENDER here used were made in 1775 and were handed down to Mrs. Daniel Tobin a member of this congregation by her parents who settled near Allentown City works site.. then, came to Luden Laconing Co. where they built their home along the Susquchanna River near Williamsport, Pa. Mrs. Tobin's Mother was ANNA McKinley Bridgens a first cousin of President William McKinley. Mrs. Tobin relates an interesting reminiscence of her mother...that shoes had to match the dresses of that day and if one had one dozen dresses of that day they also had to have one dozen pairs of shoes... this apparently being the reason for deformed joints of that day as dresses were made to last and very often on account of much walking the feet very often became too large for the shoes.

The large manuscript on which belongs to Miss Minie and Miss Elsie Johnston and is supposed to have been one of the hidden bibles when manuscripts were destroyed.. This is one of the bibles translated from Latin into German by Martin Luther who was educated a monk and later became a great Protestant leader. The translation supposed to have taken place in a room of Wartburg castle. It bears the following dates..1500....1530...and 1737. The Great-great grand-parents of the Misses Johnston were residents of Wittenberg, Germany and came to this country in a sailing vessel which drifted on the Atlantic Ocean for three months.

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INTRODUCTION

" "That which hath been is now; and that which is to be hath already been; and God requireth that which is past."

Ecclesiastes 3 : 15

It is not necessary now to trace the historical connection of these passages. It is enough for us to know that they contain the thought which justifies the preparation of this history.

We are taught that God keeps "books" in which he records the doings of men and nations for all time, and that these "books" are traced by a hand that makes no mistakes. That which specially concerns men is written in the Bible. Here, "whatever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope." Whether man tried to imitate God in his history writing, or whether God first gave man the command to write and taught him the way, is not material. Of the one thing we are sure, men have been writing histories from the earliest ages. The most interesting of all histories are those of individual human life, because in them we so often find that which appeals to our sympathy, sometimes so powerfully as to call forth tears of joy or sorrow.

Strangers often write the histories of nations. Friends usually write the histories of families. But Congregational histories, to be accurate, should be autobiographical. After a generation of people has lived and died, it is seldom that anyone in the next generation takes sufficient interest in it to immortalize its deeds by giving them a permanent form; and almost always, if that generation did not think enough of its own life to write it for a memorial in a book, it did not leave enough material behind out of which anyone living a few years later can construct a continuous narrative. The longer it is delayed the more difficult becomes the work of the historian. The number of living Witnesses constantly decreases until all are gone, when the information must be obtained "second hand". And as time passes, old records are mislaid, and finally lost.

No narrative of this congregation has ever been attempted by anyone, so far as now known. No one has tried to gather up the earlier history that might "tell it to the generations following". Every living witness of its organization has long since joined the congregation that sleeps out yonder in the old graveyard. Only little fragments of its earliest records can be found today, and none reaching farther back than 1817. The earliest Session records go back only to 1841. For what

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follows I acknowledge my indebtedness, in part, to the records of Monongahela Presbytery, to articles published in old reviews and papers, to "Scouller's Manual", to monuments in the graveyard and to the "Traditions of the Elders". Gathered From such varied sources, sometimes very meager, I cannot claim perfection for my work; but I have been able to gather in such an order as to give as correct a history of the congregation as can now be obtained. I have verified as far as possible the statements made, so that it might be useful for reference in time to come.

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ORGANIZATION

The Associate Reformed Church of North America, though claiming descent from a noble Presbyterian ancestry in Britain, and though claiming to adhere closely to the doctrines and usages of the Presbyterian churches of Scotland and the North of Ireland, had its ecclesiastical origin in the United States. On the 13th of June, 1782, the Associate or Seceder, and the Reformed Presbyterian and or Covenanter Churches effected a union at Pequa, Pennsylvania, and the very name of the body thus formed might be indicative of its origin, it was called, "The Associate Reformed Church." As early as the year 1772, and perhaps even earlier, the members belonging to these churches east of the mountains, moved to Western Pennsylvania, to make for themselves and their children a home. In that year Gabriel Walker built his cabin near what is now Hay's Crossing on the Pan-Handle Railroad, and his brother, Isaac, built near the present site of Walker's Mills. In the year 1785 Matthew McConnell settled on the farm on which his grandson, J. P. McConnell, now lives, and these two farms mark very nearly the boundary lines of the territory afterwards covered by the congregation of Robinson's Run. About the same time another family by the name of Walker settled near the place now called North Star, and we learn from the lately published history of Allegheny County, that some of the first members lived near Woodville, as early as 1785, and these places were well within the limits of the congregation.

The congregation is so named from the stream which traverses the valley just northwest of the church, and we learn that it took the name of Robinson's Run from the fact that a man named Robinson entered a large tract of land lying up on the hills north of the stream, just opposite Willow Grove Station.

These early settlers were of that good old Scotch-Irish stock that has made Western Pennsylvania noted in the rise and progress of the country. And their courage was put to as great a test as was that of their fathers across the sea. Let us remember that the Indian war-whoop had not ceased to resound up and down these valleys, when these pioneers settled. In 1782 Gabriel Walker's cabin was burned by the Indians, two of his children murdered, and three of the family carried away captive. The times were perilous; they were never for a moment secure; even when they met for worship, they sat with their trusty rifle in one hand their Psalm book in the other.

If these dangers to which they were exposed were not enough to drive them together, their clannish Scotch blood and their community of faith bound them together as with hooks of steel. Therefore we are not surprised to learn that when Rev. John Cuthbertson, of Octaro, Pa., made his wonderful journey west-

ward over the mountains in 1779, he found what then might be called a large number of people, Associate and Reformed, scattered over the counties of Westmoreland and Allegheny, waiting to hear the Gospel from his lips. In the year 1878 Revs. A.S. Aiken and M.J. Adair published "A Biographical Sketch of the Rev. John Cuthbertson, the first Reformed Presbyterian Minister in America." They obtained their facts principally from "a faithful copy of the original diary" kept by that Godly man. Westmoreland Presbytery, also "Shirtee" Chartiers and Miller's-Run.

From this work we learn that he preached at Forks-of-Yough, now Bethesda, Westmoreland Presbytery, also "Shirtee" (Chartiers and Miller's Run. He preached at the house of Matthew McConnell and baptized two of his children, Francis and John, and also at the house of Mr. Walker, but which of the families above mentioned we cannot tell, for both were among the first members of the congregation. Let it be marked that Matthew McConnell was one of the four Ruling Elders ordained at the organization of the congregation of Robinson's Run.

This would seem to settle the point, disputed by some as to whether Mr. Cuthbertson ever preached within the bounds of this congregation. But we have another proof. In his charge at Octoraro, Pa., he used "Communion Tokens" made of lead, containing on one side "R.P. in rude raised letters for Reformed Presbyterian, and on the reverse in two lines, "LS" for Lord's Supper, and the date, 1752. One of these tokens is now in the possession of the present pastor of Robinson's Run, obtained from a Ruling Elder. How shall we account for its presence here? What more reasonable than to believe that Mr. Cuthbertson left it with some one of the little band which he first gathered together, and, with others that have been used at various times, it has been handed down from generation to generation?

We have no proof that Mr. Cuthbertson organized any congregations, and the probability is that he did not, but other ministers followed soon after. In answer to a petition sent to the Second Associate Reformed Presbytery of Pennsylvania, the Rev. Matthew Lind labored among these societies part of September and October, 1780, and in 1781 Rev. Alexander Dobbin Visited them. We learn also that the societies west of the Monongahela River had one-third of the minister's time, and those on the east side the remaining two-thirds.

The union between the Associate and Reformed Presbyteries in 1782, already mentioned, made it possible for the Rev. Matthew Henderson, Sr., an Associate minister who had been settled in Chartiers and Buffalo, Washington Co., Pa., the year before, to minister to congregations which had belonged to the Reformed Presbytery. His son, Matthew, who was ordained and installed pastor in Forks-of-Yough in 1785 also preached for the vacancies west of the Monongahela

"Col. Henry Noble's merchant mill at Noble' - burg was one of the first in the county. It was a log building, erected 1788 or 1789, and stood for some months before the buhrs were put in for grinding. In the fall of 1790 the "Sacrament of the Lord's Supper" was dispensed in this mill, and at that time there was a fully organized congregation, with four Ruling Elders. Children were baptized on Monday, and after services the congregation decided to build the first log church "near the tent". Rev. Howlitsen or Hewlitsen, officiated on this occasion, but nothing more is remembered about him except that he was a young man of great learning and a good speaker. There is a tradition that he died soon after, within the bounds of this congregation, and was buried near Cannonsburg, but diligent search failed to find his grave.

These are all the reliable facts we have been able to glean from many sources concerning the early preaching of Reformed ministers in this region and the organization of Robinson's Run. Let it be remembered that formal organization was not essential in that early day. It was not even possible. They were too far from the superior court across the mountains. But their faith in the doctrines which they professed was most intense, and "for the faith which was once delivered unto saints the saints" they were ready "to contend" to the bitter end. For this reason the heritage which we have today is a goodly one in purity of doctrine

PASTOTATES

First. Nothing definite is known concerning the amount of preaching which the congregation enjoyed until after the organization of the Second Associate Reformed Presbytery of Pennsylvania on June 24, 1793; but from this time onward we have the records of this Presbytery, which are quite full. On October 14th of the above year, Presbytery met at Brush Creek, now Bethel, Westmoreland Presbytery, and in the minutes of that meeting we find the following: Heard a petition from the united congregations of Robinson's Run and "Pitts Burg desiring a supply of preaching." Whether the place called "Pitts Burg" was what is now called Pittsburgh or whether it was what is now called Union, we have no means of knowing. In answer to this petition, the Rev. Robert Warick was appointed to Robinson's Run the third Sabbath of November. "Again on February 5, 1794 when Presbytery met at "Yough Meeting House" the minutes read, "Heard a verbal petition for a supply of preaching from Robinson's Congregation, by Mr. Isaac Walker." This is the Walker already mentioned as having built his cabin near the present site of Walker's Mills, and he afterwards became one of the first Ruling Elders in the congregation at Union at its organization. The petition was granted and Mr. Henderson was "appointed Sabbath Week". Two months later, when Presbytery met at the same place, Robinson's Run asked for "a supply of preaching and the administration of the Sacrament of the Supper." Mr. James McKnight who was licensed at the same meeting of Presbytery, was "appointed to this service the third Sabbath of April."

At the meeting of Presbytery held October 28, 1793, Mr. Jamison was Appointed to write to Messrs. Riddle and Edgar, of Ireland, giving them a fair statement of the great need of faithful ministers of the Gospel in America". Doubtless the Rev. John Jamison performed the duty assigned him, but it was not necessary, for Mr. Riddle must have been on his way to America at that time. For, at the meeting of Presbytery held May 15, 1794, six and one half months later, we find this record:

"The Rev. John Riddle appeared and produced his credentials, of which the following is a true copy:

' Armagh, June 2nd, 1793

The Presbytery of Monaghan being informed that the Rev. John Riddle intends going to America, do hereby certify that he was regularly educated for the holy ministry, that he received a Degree of Master of Arts at the University of Glasgow, that he is an ordained minister of the Gospel, free of Public scandal or ground of church censure known to us, and that he may be received by any congregation or Presbytery where God in his providence orders his lot, being in full communion with the Presbytery of Monaghan at his departure.

'Andrew Caldwell, Mod' r.

'John Rodgers, CL'k, pro tem

N.B. He is married to Margaret Arnold who is also a regular member, and I do also certify that frequent applications were made to our Presbytery from America for preachers, and the Associate Synod of Ireland ordered their Presbyteries to give a benediceissit to any preacher who chose to go.

'John Rodgers, clerk of Associate Synod'.

You will notice that his "credentials" bear a date three and one-half months before Mr. Jamison was directed to write. Presbytery accepted his recommendation, added his name to the roll of Presbytery and "invited him to a seat, which he accordingly took." At this same meeting we find that Presbytery received a petition from the "united congregations of Robinson's Run and Steep Hollow (not Deep Hollow as sometimes written), praying Presbytery to settle Rev. John Riddle among them as their pastor, with all possible expedition. The petition was sustained as a Gospel call", presented to the candidate and by him accepted. Presbytery met a month later at "Georges Creek Meeting House," and appointed the Sacrament of the Supper to be administered at Robinson's Run, the third Sabbath of August, and then adjourned "to meet at Robinson's Run tent, on the 15th of August, for the installation of Mr. Riddle, Mr. Henderson to preside and Mr. Jamison to assist.

When Presbytery met according to adjournment, immediately after the reading of the minutes of the last session we find the following record:

"Appointed a messenger to go immediately to the Tent and read a certification to the people of this congregation now assembled, that the Presbytery is now constituted, and as Mr. Riddle's Edict has been formally served, if any person, or persons, have objections to his installment to come forward and show reason why Presbytery should not proceed, or otherwise, his installment will take place immediately after the forenoon sermon. No person appearing to object, Presbytery proceeded to the Tent, and after a sermon by Mr. Henderson from I Peter v: 2 "Feed the flock of God", the congregation signified their continued adherence to the call. Mr. Riddle was called forward, answered the usual questions, and was by supplication and prayer, set apart to the pastoral charge of the united congregations of Robinson's Run and Steep Hollow.

Here we find the congregation entering on a period of great prosperity. There were, perhaps, twenty families at the time of Mr. Riddle's settlement. In 1804, ten years later we find the first "Statistical Table" of the Presbytery. Mr. Riddle was the chairman of the committee which prepared this report for Synod, and he says it is not complete, "but as much as could be procured." This report gives "125 families" and "260 adults".

for the two congregations. Supposing them to be of equal strength, we have 62 families belonging to Robinson's Run. In 1814 he re-410 members and in 1815, 429 members, but the two congregations were still counted together.

But these pioneer fathers and mothers had many difficulties with which to contend. A hint at a few of them is all that time and space will allow. All their "merchandise" had to be carried on pack-horses or hauled in "Pennsylvania wagons" a distance of 250 or 300 miles to find a market, and it required over a month to make the round trip. Every bushel of salt had to be brought over the mountains. Here is an incident which illustrates two things -- the straits to which they were driven and the tenacity with which they held the forms of their religion. When Rev. Matthew Lind entered on his pastorate at Forks of Yough, it was decided to hold their communion a month later, but it was found that there was no wine in all the congregation. The people assembled and resolved that "Thomas Drennen be sent down over the mountains for two and three-quarters gallons of wine, and that he be paid \$12.00 (twelve dollars) for his trouble, together with his bill of expenses". We learn that the cost of that communion was nearly forty pounds.

From sheer necessity their homes had but few comforts and no luxuries. Their dwellings were log cabins, with a clapboard roof and an earthen floor of "puchheons". But their privations were only "obstacles to be overcome". About 1780 the section of country west of the Monongahela River and south of the Ohio, filled up very rapidly with permanent settlers. Land was cheap and everything that could be raised by a farmer in a new country sold well. We learn that five years before this country was organized, pork sold for \$ 1.00 per pound in Pittsburgh. Of course it was not long before the tide turned. These hillsides were so rapidly cleared of timber, and cultivated, that five years after it was organized the production was so great that the market was glutted. Flour sold in Pittsburgh for \$1.00 per barrel. The farmers were reduced to actual distress by want of a market for their produce. The lower Mississippi was held by the French, so that they had no outlet by water, and they could not wagon it over the mountains. What was to be done? The devil, ever ready with temptation in time of need, opened wide a door. If they could not sell their grain, they could turn it into whiskey, an article that makes its own market.

What was the result? Distilleries were planted up and down every valley. At once Government laid its hand on the "worm" and taxed its product "from nine to twenty-five cents a gallon, according to the strength of the spirit distilled". This took away the profits of the farmer and brought on the "whiskey Rebellion". One of the battles if it is worthy of the name, was fought on the southern border of the congregation, near Woodville, and the attacking party was gathered from the "stills" westward to Pigeon Creek in Washington County. Doubtless they acted on the

best light they then had, but those who have reaped their sowing in bitter tears, have often thought they acted like children. Verily they knew not what they did.

But in face of all these difficulties, both financial and social, both congregations prospered, and so we are not surprised when we learn that in the year 1816 they took the following action. Some time previous to this year, Steep Hollow came to be known as Lower Robinson's Run, or Lower Branch, but just when I could not learn. Also the name of the Presbytery was changed on Dec. 1, 1802 to "The Associate Reformed Presbytery of Monongahela". On September 11, 1816, Presbytery met at Robinson's Run, and at this meeting Mr. Riddell applied for the dissolution of the pastoral relationship between himself and the Lower Branch of his charge. His reason was stated in a paper of which the following is a copy:

"As each branch of my congregation has made arrangements whereby they will be enabled to enjoy the entire labors of a stated pastor ** to prepare the way for so desirable an event, I hereby request the Presbytery to release me from the pastoral charge of the Lower Branch of my congregation. Signed John Riddell".

Presbytery's record furnishes the following:

"Agreeably to a contract recently entered into betwixt both parts of the congregation, the Lower Branch consented to relinquish their claim to Mr. Riddell's labors; and the Upper Branch pledges themselves to give him adequate support for the whole of his time, (the sum proposed and accepted was \$ 400 annually.) Mr. Riddell's request was granted.

At the next meeting of Presbytery the Lower Branch emphasized its separation by changing its name to Union, but after this we occasionally find Mr. Riddell preaching there by appointment of the Presbytery, once dispensing the sacrament for them, two and a half years later moderating the call for their next pastor, the Rev. Moses Kerr. But from this time onward our history deals only with Robinson's Run.

Having the undivided labors of their able pastor, beloved and honored, not only in the congregation, but throughout the whole Synod of the West, of which he was the leading spirit, they seem to have enjoyed a period of peace and prosperity. Their membership increased, and at the successive meetings of Presbytery their pastor was almost invariably the first to report "paid" the various Assessments made upon the congregation to defray the expenses of the delegates attending Synod and the other benevolent work of the church.

"When Presbytery met here on Sept. 2, 1813 Mr. Riddell moved and Mr. Kerr seconded the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Resolved that unless particular business shall render it necessary, the meeting of this Presbytery, shall in future be held alternately at Sinclair and Robinson's Run churches". In 1815 there was a motion made to rescind this action, but it was lost. Again in 1816, a like unsuccessful effort was made. But on October 30, 1822 the resolution was repealed. This was no light burden on the congregation, for sometimes their meetings lasted through two or three days, with a night session held at a private house.

Of course this saved the pastor some travel, but yet his work was not without great difficulties. Even after he was released from Union, his territory was about twenty miles long by ten miles broad and often called beyond these limits by those who were not members, yet it is testified of him that "he filled the full measure of pastoral duty in his charge". Some of his later years were very much embittered by the fact that some of his members "unjustly withheld moneys due him", compelling him to have "recourse to the law for their collection". Besides this, his fearless and independent way of thinking sometimes led him into a course of action not approved by his ministerial brethren. Twice he was called upon to defend himself before the Presbytery. Once for baptizing children in the congregation of Steubenville under circumstances by some not considered constitutional, but when explained, Presbytery sustained him. At another time he refused to allow the Rev. Mr. Graham to assist him at communion in his own congregation because "He had spoken irreverently of the Scriptures in avowing that some chapters were not fit to be read." He "feared that to admit a man who had made such an avowal to preach in his pulpit would give offence to his congregation", After considerable discussion in Presbytery, his conduct was approved.

But his energies were not confined to the limits of his own congregation. He took great interest in the general work of the church at large. He led in that movement which resulted in the establishment of the Synod of Scotia, and was the master mind in the Synod of the West. To the work carried on by these bodies, he gave much thought and unsparring labor. On the 13th of April 1808, he was elected clerk of the Presbytery of Monongahela, and for twenty years the records were all in his handwriting. As we continue to read these old time-worn pages, now yellow and dim with age, we find a new hand is now holding the pen. We look up and find the date is Sept. 2, 1829. We enquire why, and we learn that the hand that has held it so long is growing cold in death, and two days later Dr. Riddell rests from his labors. For 35 years, 3 months and 19 days he had ministered to the people of Robinson's Run.

He left his home across the sea under the full conviction that he was called of God to come to America, and shortly after his ordination he made a home on a piece of land lying between Oakdale and Gregg's Crossing, and from that spot as a center, he traveled on foot and on horseback all over these hills and valleys preaching the Gospel of the Lord Jesus. He did not seek the comforts of the oldre settlements but voluntarily became a "voice in the wilderness" preaching to those "scattered abroad". His labor was not without its reward. He lived to see a vast forest, with here and there a few log cabins in it, changed into a hilly, productive, fertile region, full of comfortably homes. And he left his own enterprise, activity, grace and moral power so deeply impressed on his people that many generations yet to come, shall rise up and call him blessed.

His last sermon, preached four weeks before his death, was from Phil. 3: 17-21 "Brethren, be ye followers together of me, etc." And those who heard him testified afterward that he spoke with great feeling and power. And what wonder? He was standing on the threshold of eternal glory, calling back to his beloved children, "Follow me". Thirty-one days fiery trial, then rest. He died November 4, 1829, and two days later his body was hauled to the graveyard on the front carriage of a common road wagon, and buried almost in the very center, where he lies surrounded by a congregation that far outnumbers the living gathered here today, waiting the trumpet call of God. Will I err very much if I ask you to drop a tear now on the grave of him who went forth weeping as he sowed the seed of our coming back today rejoicing, bringing our shaaaves with us?

Second. At the meeting of Presbytery held October 8, 1829, the congregation made application for a "supply of preaching" and the Revs. Mung Dick and James McConnell were appointed to administer the Sacrament on the second Sabbath of November. From that time untill August 4, 1830, by the appointment of Presbytery, they received eighteen days preaching, two of which were communion occasions. The following brethren officiated: Revs. James Brown, James Worth, Andrew Stark, Joseph Kerr, George Buchanan, Harry Connelly, John Dickey, and Mungo Dick. On April 27, 1831 Robinson's Run asked for the moderation of a call, and Rev. William Wallace was appointed to perform this duty on May 5th, when he and Mr. Dickey would dispense the supper.

A called meeting of Presbytery was held at West Middletown, July 13th, following, "for the purpose of receiving a call from Robinson's Run, and if it should be sustained, to transfer it to the Second Presbytery of Ohio, in order that it might be presented to Mr. Parks, who is under the direction of that Presbytery, and for whom the call was made out."

The first part of the report deals with the general situation of the country and the progress of the work of the Commission. It is followed by a detailed account of the work of the various departments and the results of the investigations. The report concludes with a summary of the findings and a list of recommendations.

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The call was sustained and transferred, and the clerk was directed to request said Presbytery to "have the call presented as soon as practicable". But only two ministers and one ruling elder were present at the above meeting of Presbytery. At the next meeting, held in Pittsburgh, September 14th, a committee were appointed to "report on the subject of the called meeting". The result was that Presbytery declared "the proceedings of the aforesaid meeting illegal, and no act of Presbytery can legalize them". This is the last heard of the call addressed to Mr. Parks, but we conclude that it was declined, for at this meeting the congregation asked for the moderation of a call, and the Rev. John Wickey was appointed to this duty. At the time the call for Mr. Parks was made, the Rev. Alexander McCahan was a candidate and received thirteen votes.

During the next seven months, by the appointment of Presbytery, they received eight days preaching, by the following brethren: Andrew Stark, A.S. Fulton, J.T. Pressley and George Buchanan dispensed the Supper. This brings us up to April 24, 1832, when they appointed as stated supply petitioned Presbytery for the Rev. John T. Pressley's appointment as stated supply for six months. Presbytery resolved that "he spend his time at Robinson's Run, and elsewhere at his own discretion to the next meeting of Synod." How many Sabbaths he preached we do not know but they paid him \$ 125.00 for his services. During the next year, besides Mr. Kerr's half time, they received fourteen days preaching.

Sept. 2, 1834, the congregation presented to Presbytery a call addressed to Rev. Moses Kerr, Jr., which was sustained and immediately presented to the candidate, who asked and obtained the privilege of retaining it for consideration. when Presbytery met that evening, Mr. Kerr "declared his acceptance of the call". Arrangements were made for his installation on the "first Thursday (2d) of October. Rev. Alexander McCahan was to preach the sermon, Rev. George to give the charges and George Kelso to read the edict. The official record does not state whether this commission performed its duty or not, but we learn from other sources that he was installed according to appointment. Three weeks later Presbytery received a call from Cannonsburg, Pa., addressed to Mr. Kerr, but Presbytery refused to present it, "in as much as he had previously received a call from another congregation".

When they had enjoyed their new pastor's services but two months, we are surprised to find him asking Presbytery "to supply the congregation of Robinson's Run until next meeting" which was granted. "Next meeting" was held April 24, 1835, when we find the following record: "The Rev. Moses Kerr requested Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral connection existing between him and the congregation of Robinson's Run. His request was granted". A short pastorate. Only six months from his installation until he was released, and only two months active work

During that time he lived in "Allegheny Town", riding out on horseback Sabbath morning, and returning the same evening. From a sketch of his life written by his brother, the late D. R. Kerr, D.D., we learn that he had weak lungs, and that he was attacked with hemorrhage, in consequence of which he demitted his charge. After this he discharged for a time the duties of Professor of Languages in the Western University; afterwards of Biblical Literature and Criticism in the Theological Seminary in Allegheny. Three years later he became pastor of the Third Church, Pittsburgh, and there he died January 26, 1840. His ministry in this congregation was too brief for man's reckoning to count the results, but doubtless God will gather the sheaves from his sowing in weakness.

Third. The same Presbytery that released Mr. Kerr appointed Rev. George Buchanan to moderate a call at the convenience of the parties. By the time the Presbytery held its October meeting, the congregation was ready with another call addressed to Mr. William Burnett, and Presbytery decided "to proceed at once to dispose of the call according to the constitution". Mr. Burnett had been received by this Presbytery as a student of Theology on August 30, 1833, and afterwards certified him to the First Presbytery of Ohio. He now presented his "credentials" which were, and Presbytery resolved to proceed to his ordination and installation at its next meeting, and appointed Dr. Pressley to preach in the congregation the preceeding Sabbath and read the edict. in the Ordination services, Rev. Samuel Taggart was appointed to preach the sermon, Rev. William Wallace to preside and address the candidate, and Dr. Pressley address the congregation.

Presbytery met, according to adjournment, on April 12, 1836, and held a three days session. Three young men, Messrs. Burnett, Instry, and Osborn were to give their trials for ordination at this meeting. The first forenoon one sermon was heard from each candidate, when Presbytery resolved to "dispense with the remaining pieces of trial assigned to Mr. Burnett", and on "tomorrow, at the hour of 12 o'clock," proceed with his ordination and installation. Accordingly at high noon, April 13, 1836 after having been Vacant for a little more than six and one-half years, they saw a pastor settled among them.

At a meeting of Presbytery held May 25, 1837, the Second A.R. congregation of Pittsburgh, addressed a call to Mr. Burnett, Which was sustained and ordered to lie on the table, and the clerk was directed to cite both congregations to appear at the next meeting to be held in Robinson's Run the fourth Tuesday of June. The meeting was held on the 27th, and after the commissioners from both congregations were heard, a motion was made to present the call, which was afterwards withdrawn, and the commissioners from Pittsburgh "requested that the call be postponed, but their request was not granted". The motion to present the call was renewed, and amended, when the following was substituted:

This is a strong argument in favor of the theory of the purpose of life, and the author concludes that this is the most plausible theory of the meaning of life.

"Resolved, that the translation of Mr. Burnett from the congregation of Robinson's Run to the second congregation of Pittsburgh is proper". The "vote was then taken and decided in the negative, nemine contradicenti". Doubtless this was a happy termination of their suspense, for they immediately gave him a vacation to visit his friends in the South, and Presbytery supplied his pulpit part of two months.

But their relation as pastor and people was destined to be brief. Only eleven months later, April 10, 1838, Mr. Burnett presented to Presbytery a petition asking for the dissolution of the pastoral relation, and also submitted a letter addressed to the congregation. "The commissioners from Robinson's were next heard in relation to this petition". While this was under consideration, Presbytery took a recess till 7 o'clock that evening. But the records of the evening session do not show that any action was taken, but we presume that he was released, for the minutes of the next day show the appointment of Rev. A.S. Fulton to moderate a call at the convenience of the congregation.

I am able to say but little concerning Rev. William Burnett. At the time he accepted the call he lived in Cannonsburg, and rode back and forth on horseback. Then he moved to a log house on the farm now owned by William Kelso, of California, and while there he bought a part of the farm now owned by Andrew Shane, and built what is now their kitchen and diningroom, but just as it was about finished, his wife died and he left the congregation, after a pastorate of less than two years. Afterward he was president of Franklin College, 1839-1840; pastor of the Fourth A.R. Church, Pittsburgh 1840-1841, and Mt. Nebo 1845-1851. After this he went to the Presbyterian Church, and died August 20, 1854.

Fourth. Again the congregation was dependent on the Presbytery for their supply of preaching, and again their choice fell on a young man. On April 16, 1839, they addressed a call to Mr. James Grier, a licentiate of the Presbytery, who was well known to most of those who signed the call. When it was presented, the candidate asked and obtained time for consideration, and at the evening session accepted the call. To Mr. Grier were assigned the following "pieces of trial for ordination: For lecture Gal. iv: 21-31; For Popular Sermon, II Cor. v: 17". The following preamble and resolution was adopted by Presbytery: "Whereas, Mr. James Grier has accepted a call from Robinson's Run, and it is particularly desired by that congregation that his services should be enjoyed as soon as possible. Therefore, resolved, that Mr. Grier be delivered from his obligation to fulfill his Synodical appointment at Portsmouth". Thus, by direction of presbytery, and as the result of his call, his work begin on April 16, 1839. This should be taken into account when we compute the length of his pastorate.

At the evening session of Presbytery, held in the First Church, Pittsburgh, Aug. 13th, Mr. Grier's trials for ordination were heard and sustained, and Presbytery adjourned to meet in

in Robinson's Run, August 29th ,at 10 A.M. There was a full meeting at the time appointed, and after by sermon by Mr. Pressley, Mr. Grier was ordained to the office of the holy ministry, and installed pastor of the congregation. Rev. Matthew McKinstry delivered the charge to the pastor and Rev. John Ekin to the people.

The congregation now entered on a path that was long and comparatively uneventful. They had a man, not only settled among them as their pastor, but settled in an earthly home, on the farm between Oakdale and Noblestown, that still bears his name. Under his fostering care and the blessing of God, the congregation grew in numbers and ability. During the first twenty years a large number of Irish immigrants settled in this immediate vicinity, and finding the ordinances of worship, especially the singing of "the Lord's songs in a foreign land," in harmony with what they had left across the sea, they cast in their lot with the people of Robinson's Run. A steady growth marked their progress up to the year 1850, when the congregation of Venice was organized, taking fifty-two members from the mother church, including one Ruling Elder, Mr. John Berry. A few others left shortly after.

The next important event was the union of the Associate and the Associate Reformed bodies in 1859 which gave us a new name, "United Presbyterian", then followed the War of the Rebellion, to which the congregation gave of her sons, some to lay their lives a sacrifice on the altar of liberty, and some to return to enjoy the fruits of Victory. In the years following some changes took place that were merely local, but they seemed great to those who took part in them. On June 3, 1872 at a congregational meeting, the new version of the Psalms was adopted by a vote of sixty-two to four. June 6, 1874 a custom that had served a good purpose in its time, but had outlived its design, the distribution tokens of "Communion Tokens" was discontinued. In the month of February 1876, another swarm left the old hive and formed the congregation of McDonald, taking seventeen members, including two Ruling Elders, Mark Kobb and Samuel H. Cook. Many more living in that region left shortly after.

But a worse thing was coming upon them. Their pastor was growing feeble with the waste of years. The occasional rests they gave him did not renew nature's energies, but served as warnings of the coming separation. We do not know on what day he announced his intention to resign, but the congregational meeting held February 4, 1878, appointed Joseph Campbell, Sr., and James Sturgeon to "confer with Mr. Grier and see if he will continue in charge, provided another rest is given". The next meeting held March 18th shows that their mission was fruitless, for the commissioners to Presbytery were instructed to acquiesce in Mr. Grier's request. To Presbytery Dr. Grier presented the following: "To the Presbytery of Monongahela to meet in Nobles-town, March 26, 1878:

"dear Brethren: - I respectfully ask you to release me from the pastoral charge of the Robinson's Run congregation; a charge which I have held for thirty-nine years, but which I can no longer retain as the diversified work which it devolves upon me is too great for my present physical power of endurance. Though the congregation has offered me a vacation, yet that offer does not influence me as it might do if I were fifteen or twenty years younger than I am, or as it might do even as it is, if I were in greater certainty as to what might be the issue of a vacation of any reasonable length
(Signed) James Grier".

The commissioners stated that the "congregation sorrowfully and reluctantly acquiesced in the request of their pastor." The release was ordered to take effect April 1st, and a committee was appointed to prepare a minute for record, expressive of the feelings of Presbytery at the dissolution of this long pastorate.. No words today could so well do justice to the man and his work as the report of that committee, which was adopted by a rising vote, of which the following is a copy:

" The Presbytery having this day dissolved the pastoral relation existing between Rev. James Grier, D.D., and the congregation of Robinson's Run, Directs the following minute to be entered upon its records and to be published in the papers of the church:

In these latter days long pastorates are comparatively rare. Sometimes, after a brief period of labor, the pastor is removed by death; more frequently though some dissatisfaction on the part of the pastor or the congregation, the Presbytery is compelled, for the good of the Church, to dissolve the relationship. In this case the pastorate has continued for thirty-nine years, the longest pastorate in the history of the Presbytery. Through all these years our Heavenly Father has spared the life of Dr. Greer, and enabled him, with occasional interruptions from impaired health, to labor among the people of his first love. There is no complaint either on the part of the pastor or of the people as to the way they have discharged their mutual duties. Dr. Grier requests the dissolution because the diversified work of the pastorate is too great for his 'present physical power of endurance,' and nothing but his expressed wish leads his people to acquiesce, and influences the Presbytery to grant the dissolution.

"We cannot permit this dissolution to take place without expressing our sorrow that Dr. Grier's state of health seems to demand it. We would, however, be comforted by the thought that 'all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are called according to his purpose', and that he can make the dissolution of the pastoral relation, as well as the settlement of the,

pastor, a means of grace to them that have faith to recognize His hand in all the affairs of men.

" Nor can we permit the dissolution to take place without expressing gratitude to the Heavenly Father for having permitted the long continuance of this pastorate. We think of the long years through which he has endured, and the labors with which it has been filled; we think of the many sermons that must have been preached for the conversion of sinners and the edification of saints; we think how the dying must have been instructed, and the mourning must have been comforted; we think how often the pastor must have rejoiced with those who rejoiced, and wept with those who wept; we think how much must have been done through this long pastorate for the up-building for the cause of Christ in the community; we think of all this, and we thank God that the pastoral relation has continued so long. We know that this dissolution is accompanied with no misunderstandings or heart burnings; that the few survivors of the beginning of this pastorate still love him who guided their youthful feet in the right path, and that those who have united with the congregation in later years still revere him by whom they were baptized and received into the Church of Christ; we know that this long-time pastor still cherishes the warmest affection for those in whose service he has spent his life; we know all this, and we thank God not only that this pastorate has continued so long, but also that the dissolution of this pastoral relation is accompanied by nothing but the manifestation of the warmest affection on the part of both pastor and people.

" For the congregation of Robinson's Run our wish and prayer is that they may in due time find another pastor who will be equal in his success, in the length of his pastorate, and in his faithfulness with him who has ministered to them for the last thirty-nine years. For our brother, Dr. Grier, our hope and prayer is that he may, after being relieved of pastoral duty, soon be restored to complete health; that he may yet for many years be spared to serve the master and Church, and that he may always enjoy the promises of the Gospel he has so long preached ".

Eight years he waited the Master's call, then on Nov. 11, 1886 at 2:25 P.M. he went to receive the reward of " the Man of God". The Saturday following his children gathered round his grave and laid him to rest in the midst of his people.

Fifth. The congregation, for the fourth time left vacant, received preaching one-half time by the appointment of Presbytery, and W.J. Wallace and Andrew Shane were appointed to secure supplies the other half time. In a meeting held April 3d, it was decided that unless a candidate had at least three-fourths of all the votes cast, all should be dropped. The candidates were Revs. J.M. Moore and S.W. Lorimer. Neither had the necessary three-fourths of all the votes, so there was no choice that day.

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On June 2, 1879, the congregation, "by unanimous vote, elected to call J.W. English, of Hogland, Ind. The call was moderated June 12th, presented to Presbytery June 24th, when it was sustained as regular and laid on the table to wait the decision of the candidate.

Presbytery met in Robinson's Run, Sept. 30, 1879, and Mr. English, having previously signified to Presbytery his intention to accept the call, was received as a Licentiate from the Presbytery of Wabash. He delivered a sermon from I Cor. ix:26 and a lecture from Rev. ii: 1-7, which were sustained as trials for ordination. After sermon by Rev. J.M. Hervy from Gen. ii: 14, and the usual examination, he was "with prayer and the laying on of hands, set apart to the office of the Gospel ministry, and installed pastor of Robinson's congregation." The pastor was addressed by Rev. J.M. McArtherr, and the people by Dr. Grier. Thus the fifth pastorate began, which has continued through a period of eleven years. Part of that time is marked by a constant numerical increase, and all of it is marked by a very decided increase in the liberality of the people. During the last three years there has been a decrease in members, which is accounted for in part by the removal of families and their land being occupied by Germans, and by the organization of the congregation of Oakdale on Aug. 8, 1889, into which twenty-eight members were led to enter, including the ruling elder, Samuel H. Sturgeon. The remainder of the present pastorate we leave for the next historian to write.

It might be a little curious to note the following: The first pastorate continued during a period of thirty-five years, three months and nineteen days; the second continued only six months and twenty-two days; the third continued one year, seven months and two days, or counting from the time his salary began the fourth continued thirty-eight years, seven months and two days, or counting from the time Dr. Grier's salary began, thirty-nine years, and the fifth has continued eleven years and eight days. That is, during the century, the congregation has had a pastor eighty-seven years, six months and sixteen days, and was vacant twelve years, five months and fourteen days.

ACTIVITIES

Missionary

At first subordinate organizations within the congregation were not known, nor were they needed. But as the years rolled on, methods changed, and the congregation, always noted for its conservatism, slowly developed in this direction also. In 1851 after due announcement from the pulpit, the people formed a society which they called "The Home Missionary Society of Robinson's Run Congregation." They adopted a long constitution consisting of nine articles, divided into seventeen sections. On Aug. 27 Dr. Pressley addressed the society on missionary work. Another meeting was held Oct. 12, 1852, when a full set of officers was elected, but they must have adjourned ~~the~~ sine die.

On June 11, 1885 a Ladies' Missionary Society was organized under a constitution in harmony with other like societies in the United Presbyterian Church. It has continued its meetings ever since, and has contributed to the various boards and funds of the Church, doing a necessary and efficient work.

Prayer Meeting

Many years ago a prayer meeting was organized in "Mohawk" school house, which afterward circulated among the houses in that valley, and on two ridges adjacent. It gradually extended its limits until it has entered the homes of the greater part of the congregation.

Sabbath School

The first official record we have of its existence is in the following minute of the Session, June 29, 1862: "Whereas there is over \$ 20.00 of surplus funds now in the treasury, it was decided to expend it in increasing our Sabbath School library." But there are those now living who remember its existence at least twenty years earlier. But from the beginning there was the practice of "Catechizing" from house to house, and who shall say that this method of Bible teaching was not the best in its day? the earlier methods are meager, but we have been able to get the following succession of Superintendants:

Robert Stewart, for several years preceeding 1785;

George K. Robb 1875 -1876;

Andrew Shane 1876 -1879;

James Wallace 1879 - 1883;

Samuel Shane, since 1888 .

Until 1879 the school met only about five months in the summer, but since that time the whole year. At first it met at 10 A.M., but on April 27, 1879 the hour of meeting was changed to "immediately after morning service."

The first of these is the fact that the population of the United States has increased from 22,000,000 in 1860 to 39,000,000 in 1880. This increase has been the result of a number of causes, but the most important is the immigration of foreign-born persons. In 1860, there were only 1,000,000 foreign-born persons in the United States, but by 1880, this number had increased to 4,000,000. This increase has been the result of a number of causes, but the most important is the immigration of foreign-born persons.

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Our Young People

At a meeting of Session held June 19, 1890, the way was prepared for the organization of "Our Young People", under the constitution provided by the Assembly's Committee. The first meeting was held on the evening of June 22d, when an organization was effected. It gives promise of doing good work.

Financial

During the earlier years of the century all the financial affairs of the congregation were in the hands of four "collectors" and a Treasurer. Not until Feb. 8, 1869, were Deacons elected, when the following were chosen: Andrew Shane, Francis Jamison, James Campbell and James McVay, John K. Cook, John Morgan, James Robb, John Morgan and W.J. Sterling. James Campbey and James McVay declined to serve, but on the day of ordination James Miller and W.J. Wallace were chosen to fill the vacancies. The finances of the congregation were under their control until Oct. 10, 1881, when the following were elected as additional Deacons: J.P. Shane, Sr., David Campbell, J.J. Campbell, W.S. Robb and James Wallace. These all refused to serve, except James Wallace. Subsequently, at a "joint meeting of the Session and Deacons, it was resolved not to ordain any more Deacons, but to elect a Board of Trustees, Two to be elected each year, to whom should be transferred the finances of the congregation, the Deacons still retaining their office." This new arrangement took place October 1, 1882.

Land

On August 23, 1797, Jacob Hanson and wife deeded a piece of land containing five acres, to the "Associate Ref. Con. of Robinson's Run, of which Rev. John Riddell is now Pastor - - - - and to the succeeding Ass. Ref. Congs. of the same place forever, for house and cemetery purposes". The price paid was thirteen dollars. This purchase did not include the ground on which the present building now stands; but included part of what is now owned by Mr. Browning. When the congregation wanted to rebuild in 1833, they made an exchange and secured, by deed, from Thomas McEwen and wife, a piece of land containing five acres, one rood and sixteen purchases for two dollars. This purchase included the ground now occupied by the church building and also the old graveyard. Needing more room for sheds, in 1873, the congregation secured, by deed, from James Mc Ewen and wife, a piece of land containing one hundred and twenty-four purchases, for one hundred and sixteen dollars and twenty-five cents. In the spring of 1889 the congregation received, as a gift, a piece of land lying at the east corner of the cemetery, containing three acres, on which they erected a parsonage, the whole property costing about three thousand dollars.

Salary

We do not know the amount of salary received by Dr. Riddell at first, but we suppose he received the same amount before the separation from Union as he received afterward, and this we know to be four hundred dollars. From some other papers we think that about 1824 it was increased to five hundred dollars, but of this we are not positive. We have no means of knowing the amount paid to either Revs. Moses Kerr or William Burnett. When the Congregation called Rev. James Grier, they promised him an annual salary of five hundred and fifty dollars. In 1863 this was increased to seven hundred dollars and in 1869 it was increased to one thousand dollars, which has been the annual salary since.

Sexton

The earliest record we have tells us that in the year 1811 the congregation paid Abraham Fink eight dollars for " Stove Attendance " for one year. This seems to have been the annual salary until 1819, when they paid Samuel English sixteen dollars for the same work. In 1840 they paid twenty-four dollars and ninety-nine and one-half cents for the same service. On December 4, 1841, the trustees entered into a contract with William Scott, to " Serve Stoves " for seventy-five dollars per year. This was supposed to be about the wages of the sexton up to June 5, 1865, when Andrew Shane was elected at a salary of one hundred dollars, which continued to be the price paid until June 5, 1876, when Robinson Wilson took charge, at a salary of eighty dollars, which service he still performs.

Buildings

" The groves that were God's first temples". Our fathers first worshipped in a " tent ". It was a raised platform, perhaps twelve feet long and eight feet wide , having one side and one end closed, and a roof sloping toward the closed side. The tent was only for the accomodation of the minister and the "Clark" who led the praise service. The people weres seated on logs in front. It was erected before 1790, and stood two hundred feet east of the front door of the present church building, on the north side of the road. It is said that there was another tent erected on the farm now owned by James Kennedy, near Oakdale, and the members of both Steep Hollow and Robinson's Run attended it.

As already mentioned, in the fall of 1790, the congregation took steps toward erecting a log building near the tent. According to the best tradition we can gather, the walls were erected during the summer of 1791. It was built of hewn logs,

resembling a Greek cross in form, while the right and left wings were about twenty feet square. This made a building about forty-eight feet by thirty - six feet, but bear in mind that these dimensions are only estimates made from memory by some now living who, when children, worshiped in it. There was no contract, but each family hewed and hauled so many logs; then they had a "raising," which occupied eight days. It was all volunteer work.

The cracks were "chinked" with small flat stones, roofed with "clapboards", and in this condition the congregation worshiped in it the following winter. During the summer of 1792 it was "daubed" and a loft laid, and the following year it was seated by contract. One of the seats is now in the possession of Nathan G. Cook. These seats were moveable and in the summer, when the weather would permit, they were taken to the front of the "tent", which stood for many a year after the log meeting house was built, and there the sons of those who had endured persecution for righteousness' sake, renewed their covenant with the God of their fathers, who was then leading them through the wilderness. After the erection of its successor it was used for school purposes, and was finally sold to John R. McEwen for thirty-five dollars. It stood within the old graveyard, a little east of the first gate. It was the place to which the gathering tribes "repaired" during the long pastorate of Dr. Riddell, and doubtless it is recorded in heaven that many were "born there".

The First Brick Church

Here our information is very meager. The congregation prepared "specifications" and advertised for bids. William Rogers proposed to build it for two thousand six hundred fifty dollars, James Moore for two thousand six hundred thirty, John Lowary for two thousand six hundred dollars. Neither of these bidders were awarded the contract, but we learn from one of them the following description: It was fifty feet by seventy-five feet, and sixteen feet high "in the clear", five double doors, twenty windows, and roofed with pine, and it was to be begun April 1, 1833, and finished before April 1, 1835. John R. McEwen and Samuel Starrett obtained the contract, and we suppose they finished it within the above dates, according to contract. It stood on almost the very spot of ground on which the present building now stands. The pulpit was on the side well, elevated several steps, and the leader of the singing occupied a raised platform in front of it. There was a double door in each end and three double doors in the side facing the pulpit, and contained eighty-eight pews, arranged in six "blocks".

Present Building

There was a called meeting of the congregation held Nov. 27, 1862, and its object, as stated by the chairman, was "to take into consideration the propriety of erecting a house of worship." It seems that only a small proportion of the congregation was present at the meeting, for they adjourned to meet Dec. 11th, when the question would be decided. On Dec. 11th, it was resolved to build, at once, a brick structure, and a committee to raise funds was appointed. This is the last we hear of either committee or house for almost three years. But it was "war time", and this is sufficient reason for their delay.

Oct. 9, 1865, the work was resumed and prosecuted to completion, but all records are lost, except a small slip of paper on which we find a statement of "W.B. Morehead, Treasurer, in account with Robinson's Run Church Building Committee", in which there is a record of eleven payments made to Alexander Davidson, the contractor. The first payment was made May 23, 1866, and the last one, June 15, 1867; therefore we conclude that it was erected within these dates. The total amount paid, in addition to the material in the old building, was ten thousand one hundred and thirty-eight dollars. It was dedicated in the winter of 1867-8, Mr. James Grier officiating. The building is eighty-four by fifty-three feet, and twenty feet high "in the clear".

Session

At the organization of the congregation four Ruling Elders were ordained and installed, as follows: James McBurney, Matthew McConnell, William Robb and John Wallace. The first addition was made some time during the winter of 1810 - 11. Three members were added at this time, Robert Campbell, James Robb and John Scott. Shortly after this John Berry came into the Session, but the date cannot be found. Two meetings of Presbytery were held in the year 1814, of which we have almost no account. We are inclined to believe that if we had the full record of these two meetings we would have the date of his ordination. A third time, Feb. 20, 1825, Dr. Riddell increased his Session by the ordination of the following: John Cook, George Kelso, Sr., James McConnell, Joseph Robb and David Rowan. On April 11, 1840, Dr. Grier ordained the following: George Kelso, Jr., Samuel D. Sturgeon and William Wallace. Oct. 9, 1851, an addition of four members was made by the ordination of Joseph Campbell, B.A. McVay, Mark Robb and William Sturgeon. Again on Nov. 27, 1862, the following were ordained: Samuel Cook, and James G. Sturgeon. At this time Richard Gladden, Sr., James Kelso and George G. Robb were elected but declined to serve. June 5, 1876, W.J. Wallace was ordained. At this time James McWhinney and Thomas Gladden were elected but declined to serve. The last addition was made June 10, 1880; James Campbell, W.J. Miller, George Robb, Samuel Sturgeon and Robert Wallace. At this time John Kelso and R.M. Shane were elected but declined the office.

THE HISTORY OF THE

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THE HISTORY OF THE

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A brief sketch of the life of each member of the Session not with us today will not be out of place in the history of the Congregation.

James McBurney was one of the first Ruling Elders, but the date of his ordination is not known. He lived on the farm now owned by the heirs of George S. Head, one mile southeast of McDonald. He afterward moved on a farm near Midway, and was unable to attend the duties of the office for a number of years before his death which took place Aug. 11, 1820, aged wighty years. He lies buried in the old graveyard.

Matthew McConnell was also one of the firstmembers of the Session. East of the mountains he was a member of Rev. Matthew Lind's congregation, as the following quaint ducument will show. Conagogueue, Aug.12, 1775.

"That the bearer Math McConnell a married person now designed for the Mack Settlement is a man of sober behaviorand religious deportment free of publock Scandal for anything known to us and has been in full communion with us and may be received into any Christian Society or congregation where providence may order his lots certified by

'Math Lind, V.D.M.

'William Galbraith".

Shortly after receiving the above certificate, in company with his father's family he crossed the mountains and settled on a farm now owned by his grandson , J.P. McConnell, an elder in Venice congregation. He was a very attractive and efficient member of Session, as his name appears frequently in the records of the Presbytery, even when he had to travel two hundred miles on horseback to reach the place of meeting. He continued in active service to the time of his death, Dec. 24, 1824, in his eighty-third year. He also sleeps in the old graveyard.

William Robb was also one of the original four. The family of Robbs' were among the first settlers in Robbs' Run, northwest of McDonald. He left the congregation in 1812, going to Clinton, Pa., where he was elected and installed in the same office. Another removal took him to Service, Pa., where he was again honored with an election to Eldership and installed by Dr. Anderson. He died there in 1816.

John Wallace was the grandfather of W.J. Wallace, the present member of Session. He was among the earliest settlers, first renting near Willow Grove, but in 1801 bought the farm on which W.S. Wallace now lives. There he died Oct. 1, 1843, having served as Elder for over fifty years. He lies buried in the old graveyard.

Robert Campbell was born in County Down, Ireland, emigrated to America in 1801, and settled in "Mohawk Valley". March 27, 1811 his name was reported to Presbytery as recently ordained, but the date is not known. In the year 1815 he removed to Guernsey County, Ohio, where he bore a very prominent part in the organization of Antrim congregation, and in which he acted as Ruling Elder to the time of his death, which occurred in 1841.

James Robb was the grandfather of Elder George Robb, whom we buried last winter. As already stated, the date of his ordination is not known, but was reported to Presbytery March 11, 1811. He lived in the "Stone House" on Robb's Run northwest of McDonald, and died about 1830. He lies in the old graveyard.

John Scott was the grandfather of John P. Scott of Venice, Pa. His father came from Scotland in the latter half of the last century and settled on a farm near Remington, Pa., where John was born. About the year 1807 he moved to Washington Co. and located on a farm, part of which is now owned by J.G. Berry. His name was also reported to Presbytery March 11, 1811, and he continued in active service till he was called to "the better country", Feb. 19, 1817, aged forty years. He sleeps in the old graveyard, just west of the white oak tree.

John Berry was the father of William Berry, now an Elder in the congregation of Center. His father came from Dublin, Ireland early enough to serve five years in the Revolutionary War. At that time he lived in Lancaster County, Pa. May 29, 1794 when two years old John came with his father's family to Washington County, and his whole life was spent on the farm where his son William now lives. The date of his ordination is not known, but it is believed to have been in 1814, or the year following. He left the congregation at the organization of Venice.

John Cook was the father of our present member, Nathan G. Cook. About 1797 he came from near Chambersburg, Pa., and settled on the farm where his son now lives. He was ordained Feb. 20, 1825 and officiated up to the time of his death, which occurred Aug. 4, 1861. He lies among the brethren in the old graveyard.

George Kelso, Sr. The family was among the earliest settlers in this section. George was born on the farm now owned by his nephew, B.M. Kelso, but his after life was spent in the "log house" later torn down by Mr. McVicker. He was ordained Feb. 20, 1825, and officiated up to the time of his death, which took place Aug. 25, 1842. He lies among his people in the old graveyard.

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James McConnell was the father of J.P. McConnell, already mentioned. He was born and lived and died on the farm now owned by his son, so that the office has been inherited as well as the farm. He was ordained Feb. 20, 1825, and continued to exercise his official duties to the time of his death. He waits the trumpet call out in the old graveyard.

Joseph Robb was the father of Ebenezer Robb, well remembered by many today. He was also a resident of Robb's Run. He was ordained Feb. 20, 1825, and fulfilled the duties of an Elder up to the time of his death, April 14, 1847, in his seventy-first year. His body lies in the family plot in the old graveyard.

David Kowen has no relatives living in this region now, so that but little could be learned about him. He lived on the farm now owned by George Kelso, and died there Dec. 24, 1834, aged seventy-six years. He was ordained Feb. 20, 1825, and is said to have been an efficient Elder. He is sleeping among his companions out in the old graveyard.

George Kelso, Jr., was born on what is now known as the "Gormley Farm" on north branch of Robinson's Run. He married Jane Robb, the second child baptized by Dr. Riddell. He settled first on the "Bamford Farm", beyond North Star, and yet, though eight miles distant, his pew was seldom vacant. He afterward bought the farm now owned by his son, James Kelso, and there he died July 31, 1862. He was ordained April 11, 1840. He served efficiently until the meeting of Session January 31, 1852, when he resigned the office "for reasons best known to himself". He also waits the call of God in the old graveyard.

Samuel D. Sturgeon was born in Oxford, Adams County, Pa., but came to Allegheny County, arriving April 8, 1801, and settled on the farm near Oakdale, part of which is now owned by his grandson, Samuel H. Sturgeon. He was ordained April 11, 1840, and served up to the time of his removal to Haysville, Ohio, in 1819, and there he died.

William Wallace was the son of the Elder, John Wallace, already mentioned. He was born in 1798 while his father lived near Willow Grove. With the exception of the first year, his whole life was spent on the farm where his son now lives, and his pew was very seldom empty. He was ordained April 11, 1840, and continued to serve the church efficiently until the infirmities of age compelled him to ask to be relieved from the active duties of the office June 12, 1880. He served as clerk of Sessions from August 13, 1841 to the close of the year 1847. He also lies in the east corner of the old graveyard.

Joseph Campbell was born in County Down, Ireland. He emigrated to America in 1820, and settled on the farm which yet bears his name in "Mohawk Valley". He was ordained Oct. 9, 1851 and continued to exercise his official duties to the time of his death Dec. 13, 1882. We laid him away in the cemetery.

B.A. McVay was the son of Benjamin McVay who came from Maryland in 1784, and the following year bought the farm on which his grandson, James, now lives. Here B.A. McVay was born, lived and died Feb. 28, 1866, and was buried in the old graveyard. He was ordained Oct. 9, 1851, and continued to serve the remainder of his life. He also served as clerk of Sessions from Jan. 31, 1852 to Feb. 10, 1856.

Mark Robb is the well known senior Elder in the Session of McDonald. He was ordained Oct. 9, 1851, and continued to exercise the office of Elder in this congregation up to the time of the organization of McDonald, when he identified himself with that movement, and was again honored with the same office. He is one of the few living today who remembers the face of Dr. Riddell.

William was a brother of Samuel S. Sturgeon of Willow Grove, and the only one of the family who became a member of Robinson's Run. He was part owner of the grist mill at Willow Grove where he lived, until he moved to Florence where he died March 3, 1883. He was ordained Oct. 9, 1851.

S.H. Cook is the well known furniture dealer of McDonald. He was ordained Nov. 27, 1862 and continued in service as Ruling Elder up to 1876 when he helped to organize McDonald where he was again elected to the same office.

James G. Sturgeon was a son of Samuel Sturgeon already mentioned and was born on the farm where he lived, and died April 17, 1887. He was ordained Nov. 27, 1862 and served as clerk of Sessions from June 7, 1866 to Feb. 3, 1877. He lies beside his friends in the old graveyard.

S.H. Sturgeon is the son of James G. already mentioned. He was ordained June 10, 1880 but went out of the congregation with the Oakdale organization, when he was again elected to the office of Ruling Elder.

George Robb died Feb. 9, 1890, and is too well remembered to need more than mention of his name. But for others we would say that he was the son of James Robb, and was born on the old Robb farm north of McDonald. He was ordained June 10, 1880, and exercised the office up to the time of his death. He sleeps in the cemetery.

We leave the history of the living members of Session to those who may care to write it.

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In General

Joseph's brethren were asked, "What is your occupation?" and they said unto Pharaoh, thy servants are shepherds, both we, and our fathers." If a like question were asked the sons of the congregation of Robinson's Run, they, too, must needs give give a like answer, saying, "Thy servants are farmers, both we, and also our fathers." Of course in the earlier years, many became "hewers of wood" and more than one became famous according as he had lifted up axes upon the thick trees." When once these hillsides were brought under cultivation, they became almost exclusively "keepers of sheep." But in these later years, while the fathers have stood by the farm, the sons and daughters have entered almost every walk of life where an honest living could be made.

After the building of the Pan Handle Railroad up the Robinson's Run Valley, a few turned their attention to coal minihing. Quite a number have entered commercial life, strictly so called, and several have entered both law and medicine, and have earned a competency. A very large number of both sexes have entered the profession of teaching, especially during the last quarter of a century. The work of William H. Jamison, who afterward entered the ministry, should be noted. Over fifty years ago he taught a Latin school in which several of the sons of the congregation were prepared for college.

So far as I have been able to find the following, the following have entered the ministry:

Joseph K. Riddell was the youngest son of the first pastor, was graduated at Jefferson in 1832, and was ordained in 1845. After serving a short time in one pastorate, he studied and practiced medicine; went to Texas for his health, and was drowned April 8, 1875.

Samuel P. Berry was born in 1823 while his parents were members of this congregation; was graduated at Jefferson in 1844; was ordained Dec. 27, 1849, and installed at Mt. Pleasant, Ohio; but after a pastorate of a little less than a year he died Dec. 9, 1850, and "his sepulchre is with us unto this day."

Vincent Cockins was born of parents who were members of Robinson's Run; was graduated at Jefferson in 1846; was ordained Dec. 31, 1850, and at the same time was installed pastor of the Fourth Church, Pittsburgh where he labored until the time of his death eleven years later.

James Kelso, a true son of the congregation, born less than half a mile from the church door, attended school at "race Paths"; graduated at Jefferson in 1846; ordained May 25, 1852; was twenty years in his first peastorate and eight in his second,

which he resigned on account of poor health, and now lives in Pasadena, California.

George D. Archibald was born in the edge of Washington County; was graduated at Jefferson in 1847; was ordained in June 1850. after preaching for a few years in this region of country and in some of the western Presbyteries, he turned his attention to farming, in Washington County, where he now lives.

Thomas Wallace was born in Ireland but came into the bounds of the congregation when quite young; attended Monmouth College, also Washington and Jefferson; was licensed by the Presbytery of Monongahela June 27, 1871, and after preaching a few times, he died Sept. 18, 1872. He sleeps in the old graveyard.

Alexander^G Wallace, D.D., a genuine son of the congregation; his grandfather, father and brother, successively, held the office of Ruling Elder; was graduated at Jefferson in 1847; ordained June 6, 1854; has held two pastorates, the first fourteen, and the second, sixteen years; has been the Second Clerk of the General Assembly since May 1868, and Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Church Extension since May 1870.

William Donaldson was born on a farm one mile southeast of McDonald, while his parents were members of the congregation; graduated at Washington and Jefferson in 1866; ordained Dec. 7, 1870; and is now in his third pastorate at Cedar Creek, Iowa.

Robert G. Campbell was born in Ireland, but came to Robinson's Run so young that the congregation can rightly claim him without adoption; graduated at Jefferson in 1863; ordained Sept. 1, 1870, and installed pastor of Lyndon, New York, which he occupied ten years; was pastor of Buffalo, Wisconsin, five years; now lives in De Witt, Iowa, and continues actively engaged in the ministry.

Thus the congregation has furnished to the ministry twice the number she has called into her own service.

And what of the history God has written? We have not touched the inner history of the congregation. We have only gathered a grain or two of truth in a great storehouse that is inexhaustible. We have chronicled only a few of the vulgar facts that lie on the surface, while all that is deepest and truest and richest and tenderest we leave for the pen of the Recording Angel to write.

We have forgotten much, and some things not forgotten we have not written; but we may be sure that God has forgotten nothing, everything is recorded. The sermons that have been preached, the prayers that have been prayed, the sighs that have been heaved, the groans that have been uttered, and the tears that have been shed, are they not all written in his book of remembrance?

"Who shall tread these crowded pews a hundred years to come? Not we; then let us so live that we "may enter in through the gates into the city" of God, and so shall we be ever with the Lord."

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
